Wouk, Herman. *The Caine Mutiny*. NY: Doubleday, 1951. First edition. With two dust-wrappers, a second-state dust-wrapper enclosing the fragments of a first-state (with *The City Boy* on the back, rather than *City Boy*). (1) Outer dust-wrapper. Fore-corners of front worn, with rubbing along front flap-hinge. Two closed tears (1/4" and 1/2") to lower edge of front. Rubbing and tiny tears to upper edge of front. Bumps and rubbing to tail and head. Chip to rear hinge at tail.
